## **VACATIONS**



Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others.

Philippians 2:4

- Use and refill a nonplastic water bottle, canteen, or thermos during your trip.
- To get to their vacation destinations, 82% of Americans drive, 15% fly, and only 3% take a bus, train, or boat.
- Bring your own luggage tag when flying. Using a permanent tag saves time at the ticket counter and eliminates waste from flimsy paper tags.
- Save money by flying with just a carry-on. The electric motors that operate carousels are energy hogs. If you must check a bag, keep it as light as possible. The more weight on the plane, the more energy it uses.



- More and more hotels are becoming eco-friendly because it saves them money. Use the same linens and towels during your visit. Washing fewer sheets and towels can save up to 40% of a hotel's water use.
- Use mapquest or google maps for directions, print on the blank side of used paper, and then recycle after you're finished. Better yet, use a GPS navigation system and eliminate paper waste altogether.
- Take public transportation once you reach your destination. Try <a href="https://www.hopstop.com">www.hopstop.com</a> to plan your bus and subway routes. Stay close to the attractions you want to see to cut down on travel costs.
- Skip the souvenirs. Most trinkets end up on a closet shelf—or in the trash. Use a travel journal and digital photographs to capture memories, then only print the photos you like. If you must buy souvenirs, purchase from local manufacturers to help support the local economy.
- Before you leave for vacation:
  - $_{\odot}$  Unplug everything except refrigerator to avoid using standby energy.
  - O Turn off the lights. Use timers on outside lights instead of letting the porch light burn constantly.
  - Stop the newspaper to avoid waste and save money.
  - Close the shades. Depending on the season, drawn shades will help heat or cool your home while you're on vacation.
  - Set your thermostat to fifty degrees during cold months and eighty-five degrees in the summer.
     You could save as much as \$100 in heating- and cooling-related energy costs while on vacation.
